

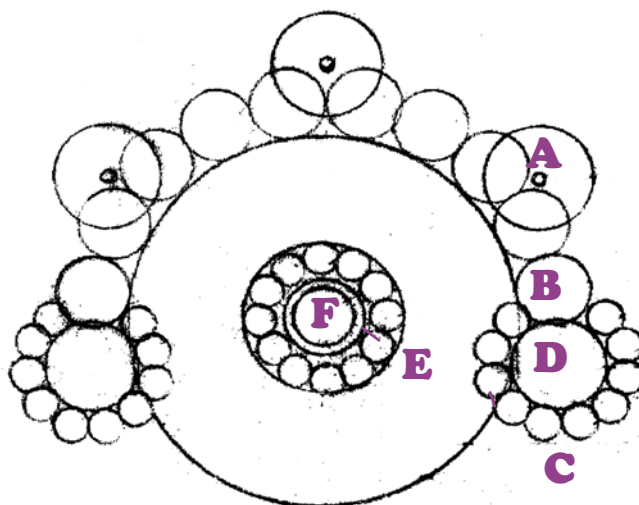

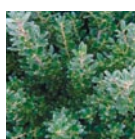

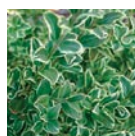


A. Camellia Standard: An old-fashion favorite with a new twist. Elegant, blooming European shrub grafted onto a topiary rootstock. Perfect for practical shade in the winter garden. Lustrous dark green foliage hosting beautiful blooms, from single to double & peony form. Hardy Zone 7.



B. Hoogendorn Holly: A low growing form of a Japanese boxwood. It is densely branched; compact evergreen shrub with handsome, dark green foliage. An elegant choice for shrub borders, as a low hedge or for mass plantings. Impressive cold hardiness, 2 feet tall.

C. Germander: A shrubby perennial for low edging and a lovely miniaturized hedge for a knot garden. Rose colored flowers appear in midsummer on evergreen leaves that resemble oak leaves. They are aromatic when crushed. Hard to zone 5. 8-10 inches tall & wide.



D. Variegated English Boxwood: The consummate hedge material for formal gardens or as formal specimen. Striking variegation on small leaves with deep green edges. Slow growth rate reduces pruning frequently. A dramatic stand out in the garden. Part shade in hot climates. Slow growing to 5 feet tall and wide.

E. Variegated Carex: Attractive, mounding ornamental grass with lustrous green and creamy white striped blades. Great for low boards or in pots. Evergreen perennial for shade or part sun. Moderate grower, 1 foot tall by 1 foot wide.
